HPROGRAMME

On The Run

The second year of the Career Path Program focuses on Job Readiness, which involves learners undertaking internships within the community. Initially, the internships were exposure based, allowing learners and the team to identify their areas of interest and strengths while eliminating industries and tasks that did not work for them. As the year progressed, the internships were streamlined to their strengths and interests.

Learners have had the opportunity to intern at a variety of organizations, including Pot pourri, Homebred by Gitika, Tuf Kote, Pioneer Auto Spares, Starbucks, Le Cafe, TAJ Wellington Mews, Mickey Mehta, and Headphone Zone. These internships have enabled learners to build valuable skills such as time management, advocacy, problem-solving, leadership, teamwork, and interpersonal communication. They have also helped identify ideal work conditions, preferred employment, and bring out skill sets that have become strengths on the job. While each internship lasted for 2-3 months, learners started with one day a week and progressed to three days a week by the end of year 2. They built resilience and self-determination through this process. On days when they did not have an internship, they came to school and continued to build on employability skills and internship-specific skills. This included tasks such as taking inventory, data entry, folding napkins, carrying out warm-up routines, among others.

The team also completed the discovery process for each of our learners, which involved home visits, interviews of parents, learners and all stakeholders, neighborhood mapping and observations of learners in the community doing familiar and unfamiliar activities. The data received through these activities will aid in customizing employment opportunities for our learners.

The Job Readiness year of the Career Path Program has been essential in preparing learners for the workforce by providing practical experiences that enable them to build essential employability skills and identify their strengths and interests. This also brings us a step closer to customizing employment opportunities for our learners.



GYM

This year we launched our very own gym in collaboration with AntiGravity Gym. The gym has been of tremendous support in helping our students build their fitness skills in authentic ways.

COLLABORATION WITH EXTERNAL PROFESSIONALS



This year the Sensory Motor Team organised professional development sessions with Lindsey Biel, an occupational therapist based in New York, whose expertise involves working with children with sensory processing difficulty. During this one year long engagement, we had the opportunity to learn about how to support children with difficulties. Visuospatial The team incorporated the learning in their curriculum and now year on year we will be offering a Unit on Visuoperceptual skills to build this foundational area that is critical for classroom learning. We also discussed specific cases for children with sensory processing difficulty and created sensory diet to help students sustain participation in school.

COLLABORATION WITH EXTERNAL PROFESSIONALS

LANGUAGE ARTS WEEK

This year's theme was Kahani, Kirdar, aur Kalakaar (story, character, and artist). Our students were given opportunities to explore diverse means of expression through language and arts. They engaged in participatory and interactive sessions which allowed them to share opinions and make connections to their own lives. On Day 1, World Read Aloud Day (क से कहानियां), Gateway teachers as well as guests from the community came in to read stories, poems, etc. and share their experiences with our students across language as well as other classes. On Day 2, Comic Carnival Day (क से कहानियां), everyone in school dressed up as a popular comic character and expressed themselves through comic-themed games and activities during the different classes throughout the day. On the final day of Language Arts Week, Little Artists Day (क से कहाकार), guests from the community conducted language or art themed workshops for our students who got the opportunity to explore their creativity and be an artist/performer. It was an exuberant week, filled with merriment and joy, which all of us thoroughly enjoyed.

PARENT PARTNERSHIP

At Gateway, parents and families work together with our team towards the common goal of serving our students. PTA helped us come back together as a community after a long break through the Diwali bash!





We started monthly coffee mornings this year as a space for parents and teachers to interact with each other apart from the beginning, middle and end of year scheduled PTCs. This allowed us and the parents to connect and build rapport with each other, and gave us space to have ongoing conversations about structures and make changes as and when needed. Parents and team alike shared how this space allowed for more fruitful conversations that directly impacted our learners.





As part of their Multidisciplinary Learning Unit class, our HSAP Sr. students learned how to make optimal and healthy food choices through a unit on food and nutrition. The unit included, among other things, an exploration of different regional cuisines of India. Parents played an integral role in this regard by reinforcing and supplementing our children's learning. They helped us organize a few lunch visits to their homes where students learned about Parsi, Sindhi, Punjabi, Karnataka, and food Parents Rajasthani and culture. painstakingly prepared mouthwateringly scrumptious feasts (savoured by students and teachers alike) and gave students a verbal primer on the peculiarities of their culinary culture.

SUMMER PROGRAMME

Gateway's summer school offered a meticulously crafted 12-day program that kept students engaged through a diverse range of activities, all conducted by field experts. The primary objective was to help students develop skills, socialize, learn collaboratively, apply their knowledge, and, of course, have fun! Each programme complemented the other, creating a seamless flow that allowed students to recognize the purpose and value in each activity. Here is an overview of the activities that took place:

Dance: With Ms. Shifa and Mr. Arbaaz, students danced their way through summer school. Learning various dance steps to popular songs, they even put together a special performance for their parents. Undoubtedly, this was the most beloved session of the summer school experience!

Fitness: Led by Mr. Frazer, in collaboration with Antigravity, this session focused on learning sports skills and agility-based activities. Students also had the opportunity to work with weights, engage in strengthening and conditioning exercises, and learn boxing techniques. It was a fantastic way to kickstart the day with a burst of energy!

Music: With Mr. Joshua, students discovered the joy of drumming to new beats, rhythms, and melodies.

Art: Conducted by Gateway's art teacher, Ms. Urvi, these sessions introduced students to different artists and their work that inspired them to create their own masterpieces.

Movement-Based Storytelling: Led by Ms. Anusree and Ms. Namaha, this therapeutic session allowed students to express themselves through body movements. Less talk, more movement - truly a calming experience!

Fashion Workshops: Celebrity Stylist Ms. Nitasha Gaurav joined the summer school to impart fashion and styling basics to the students. They had a blast hearing about her experiences, touching and understanding different fabrics, and even styling themselves for a fabulous fashion show. To deepen their learning, they visited the India in Fashion Exhibit at the Nita Mukesh Ambani Cultural Centre, where Ms. Nitasha helped them connect real-life experiences to their lessons.

Cooking: Sessions with the Culinaris Cookery Institute provided students with the opportunity to explore various textures and recipes. From chopping to kneading dough, setting up and cleaning up, students experienced the full range of culinary skills and enjoyed the fruits of their labor.

Heritage Walk: Thanks to a presentation by Mr. Harshvardhan Tanwar and Mr. Aditya Pai from No Footprints, students gained a deeper understanding of Mumbai's history. Subsequently, accompanied by Mr. Aditya, they embarked on a heritage walk from Gateway of India to Kala Ghoda, immersing themselves in the rich cultural heritage of the city.

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CAPACITY BUILDING

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IN-HOUSE CAPACITY BUILDING

Our team members continue to strive for excellence by enrolling in workshops, webinars and MOOCs. Our team members participated in school Outreach and R&D activities including mentoring and coaching external professionals; conducting workshops; and driving innovation as part of in-house task forces and the R&D team.



BOOK CLUB

Our book club community continues to grow. This year we completed 3 books. We had between 45 and 50 people sign up for each book, with over 87% of sign-ups from external professionals.

INTERNS AT GATEWAY

This year we had Interns join us from many organisations such as TISS, Hashu Advani, SNDT and many other institutions both from within and outside India. We started a Youth Internship Program this year, in order to provide high school students exposure to our field and the opportunity for them to understand if it is something they would like to pursue in the future. Having Interns work with us is a wonderful learning opportunity for us as they bring fresh perspectives and new ideas. It has been an enriching experience for both our Interns as well as our Team. We have successfully hired some of our Interns in the past and are happy to have them join our Team. The Internship Program is a wonderful learning experience for us all!

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GIVING PI AND SYMPOSIUM

This year, in collaboration with GivingPi (a network of India's most philanthropic families), we conducted a panel discussion on inclusivity in employment for people with disabilities (PwDs). The discussion was hosted by our student Siddhesh Pillai. The panel included Bobby Deol (actor and member of Gateway's Advisory Board), Kajol Devgan (actress), Mahesh Jethmalani (Member of Parliament, Rajya Sabha and member of Gateway's Advisory Board), Satish Kolte (Director of HR, Taj Wellington Mews), Timothy Riesen (Director, Research and Training at IDRPP, Utah State University), and Tricia Jones-Parkin (Principal Investigator and Trainer of Customized Employment Training, Utah State University). These esteemed panellists discussed current Indian laws related to employment of PwDs, media's role in supporting such employment, and the need for competitive integrated employment opportunities for PwDs. This was the first of our two-part attempt this month to stimulate an informed and productive public conversation on the topic.



We then hosted a hybrid symposium on employment of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities in collaboration with Utah State University's Institute for Disability Research, Policy, and Practice (IDRPP). The symposium aimed to start a multistakeholder community dialogue on current challenges and possible solutions related to employment of PwDs. Timothy Riesen and Tricia Jones-Parkin from Utah University shared international State perspectives on employment of PwDs. In addition, several other speakers talked about their work on building meaningful employment opportunities for PwDs in India. The speakers were insightful and informative and apprised attendees about several international and domestic initiatives to support employment of PwDs. The symposium also helped participating organisations identify areas for possible collaboration which could support and create additional employment opportunities for PwDs. Our WhatsApp group to support collaboration has been abuzz with ideas and suggestions.



GATEWAY PDP

Gateway's Professional Development Programme continues to grow. The professional development programme (PDP) is our initiative to build a community of educators who share our vision of an inclusive society that ensures programmes for students with special needs meet both standards of excellence and standards of equity.

We had 88 professionals from 25 different organizations and schools across Mumbai and India, participating in this endeavour; all of which were conducted and facilitated by members of the Gateway team!

PARTNERING FOR CHANGE!



We continue to partner with the Centre for Excellence in Teacher Education (CETE) at TISS to teach courses on Inclusive and Special Education to pre-service B.Ed, M.Ed, and MA in Education students.

In our first international engagement, we, along with partners from Tata Institute of Social Sciences Hyderabad and Leonard Cheshire, planned and facilitated a seven-day training session for government school leaders and teachers in Nepal on Universal Design for Learning, the use of assistive technology and ICT, and school change management. Participants who attended the training will go out and work with teachers in 122 schools across the Chitwan district in Nepal, impacting 35,000 students
